# A Life Laid Down – Sermon Notes

### I. Legacy of Obedience

- Story of Pastor Chad surrendering to God's call to rural ministry: "I'm King of the rural."
- The impact of legacy obedience in Promise's life:
  - Blake's great-grandparents and grandparents as spiritual leaders.
  - Her own grandmother and mother as faith influencers.
- Key Point: Your "yes" to Jesus creates ripple effects for generations.

### II. From Fruit to Seed

- John 12:24 unless a grain of wheat dies, it remains alone.
- Jesus was the seed who laid His life down.
- Being fruit is not enough—we must become seed for the next generation.
- Illustration: Seedless apples = end of a fruit line.
- Key Quote: "You might have become fruit—but are you willing to become seed today?"

#### III. False Gospels vs. the Real Gospel

- Warning against the rise of false gospels (comfort without obedience).
- Misinterpretation of Jesus' commands: "All I have to do is love my neighbor."

- True love for God is evidenced by keeping His commandments (John 14:15).
- Highlight of the Sermon on the Mount's intensity and call to internal holiness.
- Key Quote: "Humility is obedience."

#### **IV. Personal Testimony: A Life Set Free**

- Promise shares her journey:
  - Addictions: drugs, pornography, approval, depression.
  - Encounters with truth that brought conviction and healing.
- Transparent honesty about struggles and God's deliverance.
- Emphasizes the importance of the fear of the Lord and conviction.

### V. Boldness in Truth and Obedience

- Acts 5: The apostles rejoice in suffering for the gospel.
- Challenge to fear God more than man.
- Examples from Promise's life of responding to God's voice with immediate obedience (e.g., deleting a phone game).
- Key Quote: "Jesus, You already have my yes before You ask."

### VI. Living a Laid-Down Life

- Final call to radical obedience:
  - Forgiveness
  - Humility through obedience
  - Giving God your "yes" before understanding why

- Historical reference to Count Zinzendorf and the Moravian Movement: "This I have done for you—now what will you do for Me?"
- A life laid down will produce a harvest for generations.

## **VII. Closing Reflection**

- Visual meditation: Jesus at the whipping post (behold the man).
- Invitation to respond with surrender.
- Final call to count the cost and live for what truly matters: the Kingdom of God.
